Use of controlled medications in pain treatment. According to the WHO Guideline Cancer Pain Relief (2nd Ed) pain treatment should go in three steps: step 1: (mild pain) non-opioid analgesics (e.g. paracetamol), to which if necessary an adjuvant can be added; when a non-opioid no longer adequately controls the pain, an opioid analgesic should be added:

Opioid analgesic agents. During surgery, the patient's anesthesia provider will use several analgesic agents, including opioids and non-opioids. Commonly used opioids include fentanyl, morphine, and hydromorphone; less commonly used are remifentanyl, alfentanil, sufentanil, and meperidine. Historically, surgical pain has been treated with opioids.

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Conclusions: Although analgesic use is high in the hospital settings, adherence to the principles and recommendations of pain guidelines is low, and pain is usually common in patients treated with analgesics.
